Grammar: Comparative adjectives

Adjective + er

Adjectives of one syllable – fast, large, big

★ Add er at the end of the adjective: fast → faster

NOUN (or noun phrase)	verb	adjective + er + than	NOUN (or noun phrase)
A new computer	is	fast er than	an old one

* If the adjective ends with the letter \mathbf{e} , only add \mathbf{r} : large \rightarrow large \mathbf{r}

NOUN (or noun phrase)	verb	adjective + r + than	NOUN (or noun phrase)
A desktop	is	large r than	laptop

If the adjective ends with vowel-consonant, double the final consonant before adding er: big → bigger

NOUN	verb	adjective + consonant	NOUN
(or noun phrase)		+ er + than	(or noun phrase)
A desktop	is	big ger than	laptop

not adjective + er

We normally use the opposite adjective instead of using not adjective + er. So for example we would not say;

An old computer is **not faster** than a new one.

We would either say;

A new computer is **faster** than an old one

or

An old computer is **slower** than a new one

Adjectives of two syllables, ending in 'y' - heavy, dirty, ugly

* Replace y with i then add er: heavier, dirtier, uglier.

NOUN (or noun phrase)	verb	as adjective as	NOUN (or noun phrase)
A desktop	is	heavier than	a laptop
My screen	is	dirt ier than	yours*

not adjective + ier

We normally use the opposite adjective instead of using not adjective + ier.

So for example we would not say;

We would either say;	A laptop is not heavier than a desktop		
	A desktop is heavier than a laptop		
or	A laptop is lighter than a desktop		

Adjectives of more than two syllables - expensive, powerful

NOUN (or noun phrase)	verb	more / less + adjective + than (three syllables or more)	NOUN (or noun phrase)
A laptop	is	more expensive <i>than</i>	a desktop
His laptop	is	less powerful than	my tablet

not more / not less

We often use the opposite adjective instead of using not more / not less.

So for example we would not say;

A laptop is **not more expensive than** a desktop.

¹ The word **yours** is a possessive pronoun and is used here to replace the phrase **your screen**. This is to avoid repeating the word **screen**.

We would either say;

A laptop is **more expensive than** a desktop.

or

A desktop is **cheaper than** a laptop.

Irregular comparative adjectives - good / bad

To make comparisons with the adjectives **good** or **bad**, we do not add **er** but use the words **better** and **worse**.

NOUN (or noun phrase)	verb	better / worse + than	NOUN (or noun phrase)
Laptops	are	better than	tablets
Tablets	are	worse than	desktops
